How can this country accept the burden of so many Vietnamese refugees at a time when we are undergoing such a high rate of unemployment?

K. O'R.—Watervliet

While I can understand your concern for the timing of the influx, I do not believe that we can turn our backs on the Vietnamese who are seeking refuge from political persecution. Not only is it in our tradition to welcome them, but we have the economic capacity to do so, even in these times. In the late 1950s and early 1960s this nation had the imagination to accept more than 700,000 refugees from repression in Cuba and Hungary, and most of them are now contributing tax-paying members of American society. I believe America still has the compassion and the economic capacity to accept and absorb the 100,000 refugees who have fled South Vietnam in fear of their lives. Moreover, I am sure that like their predecessors, the Vietnamese immigrants will make a solid contribution to American society.

I understand that you have asked the General Accounting Office for an audit of the food stamp program. Are you against food stamps?

F. L.—Buffalo

Not at all. I am trying to protect the integrity of the program by eliminating huge areas of waste. The eligibility standards are so loosely written that today more than 20% of the nation's population is qualified to receive food stamps. Taxpayers have seen the cost of the program escalate from \$75 million in 1964 to an estimated \$5 billion by the end of 1975. I have asked for information that will help me determine where we should tighten eligibility requirements, and whether there are cheaper, more efficient ways, especially surplus commodities, to distribute food to those who truly need it.

I have heard you criticize next year's projected \$70 billion federal deficit. What exactly is wrong with such a deficit?

J. S.—Skaneateles

There are only two ways to finance such a deficit. If the government borrows the money, it is competing with the many families who want to borrow money to buy a car or a house. Or the small businessman who wants to modernize his plant or buy another store—the type of economic actions that create not leaf-raking jobs, but productive, secure jobs. If the government finances the deficit by printing more money, it is planting the seeds for another serious round of inflation. With either method, the average American citizen will be one who suffers in the long run.
