Emery Urges Levitt Not To Use Pension Fund For Big MAC

State Assemblyman James L. Emery (R-Livonia) said Friday that he has written to Comptroller Arthur Levitt, urging that he "reel efforts" to spend State pension funds to purchase Municipal Assistance Corporation bonds to aid financially troubled New York City.

"Apparently a great deal of pressure is being put on the Comptroller to use these funds to buy Big MAC bonds," Emery explained. "This could be disastrous for the State and for every state taxpayer."

The Livonia Legislator, who is Deputy Minority Leader in the Assembly, explained that banks and investment houses have shunned the MAC bonds and that the Comptroller has resisted pressure in the past to pump pension money into the bonds because the funds would gain no tax advantages.

"The entire Big MAC venture is built on a house of cards. The banks and the big brokers recognize this. It would be foolhardy to use pension funds on a risky undertaking," he continued, noting that "if one card falls, the whole house comes tumbling down."

"If there has been a large commitment of State pension funds and Big MAC and New York City fail to meet their financial obligations, the taxpayers in the State are left holding the bag."

Emery praised Comptroller Levitt "as the foremost fiscal expert in the State and a man whose expertise is admired by everyone who has had the fortune to work with him. Arthur Levitt is the last bastion of fiscal responsibility in the Carey Administration."

"The Governor and Mayor Beame have continually refused to take a totally hard-line approach to the City's fiscal problems. They are simply going to have to tighten their belts and learn to live within their means, as do most of the rest of the municipalities in the State, and, for that matter, as do the vast majority of State residents," Emery concluded.
