Legal Notice

Local Law No. 3 of 1975

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the following Local Law No. 3 of 1975, which became effective July 31, 1975, is published pursuant to Section 214 (2) of the County Law.

A LOCAL LAW IN RELATION TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A TEMPORARY COMMISSION TO BE KNOWN AS THE ALLEGANY COUNTY BICENTENNIAL COMMISSION

BE IT ENACTED by the Board of Legislators of the County of Allegany as follows:

Section 1. There is hereby created a temporary county commission to be known as the Allegany county bicentennial commission for the purpose of promoting and insuring a fitting and proper celebration within the county of Allegany of the bicentennial celebration of the United States of America.

§ 2. Such commission shall have eleven members who shall be appointed by the chairman of the Allegany county board of legislators. One member shall be designated as chairman by the chairman of the Allegany county board of legislators, and the county historian shall be an ex-officio member of the commission. The members of the commission shall serve without compensation, but shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties within the appropriation for that purpose. Vacancies on the commission shall be filled for the unexpired term in the same manner as original appointments are made.

§ 3. Such commission shall have the power to cooperate with and lend assistance to the American Revolution bicentennial commission created by the congress of the United States and any similar committees or commissions created by the State of New York or any subdivision thereof to contribute to the successful celebration of the bicentennial celebration of the United States of America and to promote, attend and participate in any and all functions or ceremonies within the county of Allegany held to commemorate such occasion and to request and receive from all officers, departments and agencies of the county of Allegany such cooperation and assistance as may be necessary or appropriate to carry out the purpose of such commission. Such commission shall also exercise such other powers and perform such other duties as may be prescribed by resolution of the county board of legislators.

§ 4. Such commission may expend such sums of money to effectuate its purpose as may be made available by resolution of the county board of legislators in accordance with law. Such expenditures shall be payable by the Allegany county treasurer upon vouchers approved by the chairman of the commission and audited by the county board of legislators.

§ 5. Such commission shall report from time to time upon the progress of its work to the county board of legislators and shall also make such recommendations to the county board of legislators as it deems fit in relation to the bicentennial celebration.

§ 6. The commission hereby created shall expire on December 31, 1977, unless otherwise extended by the county board of legislators. Upon its expiration such commission shall file a final report of its activities with the county board of legislators.

§ 7. This local law shall take effect immediately.

Tomato Diseases May Cause Problems

Tomatoes are easy to grow, but in August some diseases and insects may cause problems, say Cornell University plant specialists.

Two common fungal problems called Verticillium and Fusarium wilt often attack plants in August causing yellowing, wilting, and possibly death, said Prof. Arden F. Sherf, plant pathologist at the N.Y. State College of Agriculture and Life Sciences, Cornell.

Verticillium is more of a problem in upstate New York, he said, while Fusarium is more common in the eastern counties and on Long Island. Fusarium has been found in other parts of the state where southern plants have been planted, he said.

Sherf said there isn't anything gardeners can do about these wilts. The only way of avoiding them another year is to plant a variety with built-in resistance to them. Some of these varieties are Jet Star, Springset, Better Boy, Superdwarf, and Ramapo.

Another disease that attacks tomatoes is blossom end rot, Sherf said. It produces a black leathery rot on the bottom of the fruit.

"This is caused by a calcium deficiency brought about by uneven soil moisture conditions early in the season, coupled with too much nitrogen fertilizer," Sherf explained.

"Fortunately, it's usually only the first few fruits that are affected," Sherf pointed out. "Fruits that develop at later stages stay healthy."

The most common tomato disease is a fungal infection called early blight; this appears in mid-summer as a dry brown area on the lowest leaves. If not checked, the fungus will work its way up the plant causing the leaves to turn brown and drop off, thus exposing the fruit to sunburn as well as robbing the plant of leaf surface.

As soon as this trouble is noticed, the plants should be sprayed every seven days with maneb or zineb, applied according to directions on the containers. This will insure green leaves until normal maturity.

Ms. Carolyn Klass, Cooperative Extension specialist in entomology at the College, said tiny, numerous white flies may be seen flying about the plants and these can be controlled by spraying with malathion. High populations of these flies may weaken the plant causing a reduction in the number of fruit and may subsequently cause death of the plant.

Slugs are another pest during August, eating the fruit as it ripens. Metaldehyde bait can be used on the ground to help control them, or stale beer can be placed about the plants in shallow pans. The slugs crawl into the pans and drown.
