## Greenwood Central School News

### SCHOOL OPENING

Greenwood Central School will open on September 2 for the teachers and September 3 for students with a full day of school, and classes end at 3:24. There School opens with classes at 8:24 will be a complete faculty of 28 1/2 which is an increase over 1974-75. We have added a 1/2-time Junior High Science-Math teacher and are adding an additional day for our girls physical education and swimming program. New faculty members will be Doreen Vance, 1/2 time Math-Science and Robert C. Roer, 6th grade, long term substitute to take the place of Ann Zeachne while on one year's leave of absence.

By adding 1/2 time Math-Science we are hoping to expand our offerings for the high school classes by adding Mechanical Drawing, High School Individual Arts and an expansion of our math course program.

There have been several projects going on during the summer to upgrade our facilities. Completed most recently is a complete new sewage disposal system at a cost of \$27,800.

We are replacing the floors in 8 classrooms and the halls and 2 set of steps with new tiles. 108 lockers were replaced in the 1936 portion of the building with 140 lockers we purchased second hand. The lockers were remodeled by student help through the Steuben County Summer Economic Opportunity Program.

In back of the school we have installed a new sewer and new drainage to improve the appearance and make a continual eye

sore into a very functional area. Bids were opened on July 29 for \$133,000 worth of building renovations. The following items will be done during the next 3 to 4 months:

Replace wood double hung windows on east and south elevations. (Windows on west elevation were replaced in 1973)

Replace maple gym floor with poured polyurethane floor.

Resurface tennis courts.

Sound retardant folding door in stage proscenium to allow stage to be used for music practice.

Renovations to Johnson Heat Control System.

Renovations to clock system.

New sound system.

Modernize fire alarm system.

Replace toilet room fixtures.

New toilet exhaust fans.

New ceiling exhaust fans in gym.

Rewire 1936 and 1950 buildings.

This will be paid for from a Building Reserve Fund that has been established and the remainder in State Building Aid.

Greenwood will have an anticipated enrollment of approximately 335 which is no change from the previous year.

There will be no major changes in transportation routes. We are in need of substitute bus drivers, if anyone is interested please contact the school for more information.

Andover welcomed peace with a noisy celebration Tuesday evening, almost immediately after the announcement of the Japanese surrender came over the air. Andover Village broke loose with the blowing of fire siren and condensation whistle and the ringing of the local church bells. In no time Main Street was filled with tooting cars, fire trucks with sirens screeching and with every other conceivable noise maker. Wednesday an appropriate service was held in front of the Library at which time a program was presented with Atty R. J. Sootheran as master of ceremonies. The Star Spangled Banner was played by the Band; Prayers by Rev. Walter Greene; songs led by Prof. Glenn

E. Bretsch; remarks by Rev. Greene and Rev. W. D. Shearer; music by the Band; address by Prof. James M. Wilson and the singing of God Bless America by the audience. Following the ceremonies at the Library the local Firemen and Auxiliary Ladies enjoyed a dancing party at the Fire Hall.
