A friend tells me you're trying to trim down the food stamp program. Is that true?

M. G. Utica

Yes. I recently introduced a bill to start a comprehensive reform of the food stamp program. The current program is riddled with loopholes. There are no realistic income limitations, nor are there realistic asset limitations. In fact, one food stamp recipient complained to the police that he had been robbed of \$2700 in jewelry. Currently, one out of every thirteen people receive food stamps, whereas only five years ago it was one out of forty-seven. By proposing stricter income and asset limitations, as well as other sweeping reforms, the bill would first save taxpayers \$2 billion a year, and second, expand food stamp allotments by 29% to those who truly need them.

Do you agree, in the interests of détente, with President Ford's initial snub of Alexander Solzhenitsyn?

J. G. —Tuckahoe

Not at all. The foundations of détente must be weak indeed if the President of the strongest nation of the Free World must avoid meeting with the most eloquent living spokesman for the values represented by the Free World. Détente on such terms is neither worthy of the United States nor worth keeping. Nor will it buy us ultimate safety from the dangers of which Mr. Solzhenitsyn warns.

What's this about your new law that would allow the citizen to sue the government?

R. L. —Buffalo

It is not law yet. In mid-July I introduced an amendment to a bill amending the Consumer Product Safety Act which would significantly expand the right of private parties to sue the Consumer Product Safety Commission. Current law shields the federal government from accountability for certain of its functions. For example, the CPSC erroneously listed two products of the Marlin Toy Company on its banned products list, which caused the company severe losses. Although the company was forced into bankruptcy, and had to lay off all but 3 of its 85 employees, it was not allowed to institute legal action against the government until the House of Representatives passed a special resolution allowing them to do so. My amendment (which was adopted by the Senate) would not only make government more responsive to its citizens, it would also caution government administrators to "proceed prudently."
