Residents of the Greenwood School District received tax nottoes last week that showed an increase of \$22.63 in tax rate for the
Town of Greenwood. The increase
is the result of lower equalization
rates for Townships in the District.
An increase in the full value of the
District was also reported this
year. The increase resulted in a
lower state aid ratio and an increase in the amount to be raised
locally.

The State And ratio has dropped from 74.3 per cent to 72.8 per cent which is lower than the state and ratio for most districts the size of Greenwood, a school official said. The total budget for the 1975-76 school year is \$337.796.20. It is an increase of \$201.378.20 over the 1974-75 school budget of \$685,918 of the increase \$12.4500 is for the school renovation program and \$77.378.20 is for the increase in operating expenses.
