

## GREENWOOD NEWS

There has been much mischief and pranks done in Town. Wednesday night it went too far defacing the home of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Murray. Black paint was sprayed on the front and north side, also on the porch railings and green paint. The house was newly painted this summer. It is being investigated.

Greenwood Central School Principal Gary Moore, reported to the School Board Monday night that repairs to the garage roof had been completed at a cost of \$2,500. He estimated that the summer work, performed by persons presently employed by the school and by summer workers, had saved the school between \$2,500 and \$3,000.

Senior Class privileges were granted to members of the senior class by the School Board. The students will not be required to stay in the school when they do not have classes. The Board took no action on a report from Pad-dock Pool Service of Albany. That report said that broken steps in the Pool should be replaced, a filter tank system should be repaired and iron in the water should be removed to prevent discoloration at the bottom of the pool. No estimates of costs for making the improvements was given.

The Board also adopted a new policy. It will not pay the tuition of students who have graduated from Greenwood Central School at the Board of Cooperative Educational Services. The Board had previously paid some tuitions and was later reimbursed by the State. A new State Law, which does not require the school to pay the tuition, prompted the school action.

Mr. Moore, School Board President John Hunt and Board member James Tracy, will be attending the New York State School Boards Association Meeting in Rochester October 18 - 21.

Steve Kickbush was appointed the boys Junior Varsity Soccer Coach, Robert Chris Roser was appointed the girls Soccer Coach.

Mr. Moore reported that a local crew was busy this summer with major projects to improve the school. Eight classrooms have new tile floors along with both halls and the stairs to the second floor. The lockers were replaced in the 1936 part of the building, purchased from Rush-Henrietta School District. The sewer system was completed and in use. In back of the school, two drains were installed to take care of surface water after a rain, also a new sidewalk out back. In the Science room the risers were removed and shelves installed. The Office was carpeted and half of the elementary library.

Mrs. Virginia York and her helpers cataloged all 3700 books the gift from the Ross L. Baker estate. She said 900 books went into the High School Library and the remainder of the books and shelves were placed in various classrooms. Social Studies related books in Social Studies classrooms, literature books in the English room.

Other improvements this summer: Replaced wooden windows on the east and south ends of the building with aluminum windows; replaced the gym floor with poured polyurethane floor; resurfaced the tennis courts; a sound retardant folding door was installed on stage to allow the stage to be used for a music practice area. The Johnson heat controls were renovated, also the clock system sound system and fire alarm system, toilet fixtures in the 1936 portion of the building were replaced and new toilet exhaust fans in the gym. Rewired the 1936-1950 building. Some of these are still in process and expect to be completed in four months.

There are two new teachers. Chris Roser is teaching Sixth Grade while Ann Zuschin takes a year's leave of absence. Doreen Vance teaches Math and Science in 7th and 8th and 9th Grades on half-time basis. Mr. Duke and Mr. Yarnell can now offer additional courses in Math and Science in High School. Mechanical Drawing and High School Industrial Arts and more mind courses will be offered.

Gloria Tracy resigned as Teachers Aid when she started her Beauty Shop. She has been replaced by Barbara Wallace. Shirley Losey was appointed as Cafeteria Monitor that was held by Mrs. Wallace.

Anyone wishing to work at the school or be a substitute Bus Driver, file a regular application at the school, when there is an opening, you will be improved.

Thanks to the PTA, the Alumni Association, the Greenwood Association and the Class of 1975, enough money was donated to purchase a TV Camera so the school will have the capacity to produce its own TV programs.
