The Andover Board of Education has contracted with the Andover Medical Center to have Dr. William Coch and Dr. "Toby" Atkins as school physicians.

Physical exams are to be given to all kindergarten first, third, seventh and tenth year students also students who participate in sports and cheerleading. Students needing working papers must also have an exam if not already done. If a parent wishes the exams done by a family doctor, they must contact the school and have the report sent to the school.

There will be a new dental program starting to help fight cavities. This is called the sodium fluoride mouthwash program which will include the first, third and sixth grades. This will be done in the classroom under the supervision of the teachers, with the permission of the parents. For any of you avid poetry lovers and writers out there, the National High School Poetry Press is holding its annual competition for grades seven through twelve. You say you're not good enough? One never knows for sure unless he's tried. Read on and think it over carefully.

This contest provides you with an opportunity to have one or more of your manuscripts in the National Press. Anthology of High School Poetry. The poetry can be written in any form or style or any subject of your choosing and must simply follow a few entrance rules. These include: originality, must be a type-written or ink copy on a single page with your name, home address and be submitted before the December fifth deadline.

Although subject matter is not limited, the National Poetry Press expresses a desire for works of not more than twenty lines if possible. It is an outstanding opportunity for recognition of any creative talents you may have in the way of poetry.

Also now accepting manuscripts is the Annual High School Essay Competition taking essays of not more than one hundred and fifty words on any subject. The closing date for this contest is November tenth, so if you need the exact details for these, contact Mrs. Burger as soon as possible.

There's also a chance for any of you poetry writing teachers to get into the act. The National Poetry Press extends an invitation to all teachers interested in submitting poetry to be considered for the Annual Anthology of Teachers Poetry. The closing date for this is January First and only requires that each work be on a separate sheet of paper with the author's name, address, and school.

Creatively through writing, be it prose or poetry, is only one of a thousand ways to express one's self and a talent not found in massive numbers. It can be both fun and fulfilling and should be developed whenever possible to improve awareness and creativity. Let's try a few honest efforts. A talent so inspiring to others shouldn't be suppressed.
