Answer: We have a maintenamee Crew at the school including students; it would be difficult to supervise a large number of students (10) working in different parts of the building for their detenion; this type of punishment is given when a student defaces or damages school property; detention is given for infractions of the attendance law and distruption of the learning process.

Answer: A student may and will be placed on detention each time he is deserving of it for the above stated reasons.
