Detention! — Why Me?

A new rule is in force in the Andover Central School System. "Any student late for school must make-up that time starting at 3:30 p. m. in a room designated specifically for detention."

Question: Why, if we must make up time, can't we start it at 3:15 p. m., when school is dismissed?

Answer: Students need time to go to their lockers, go to the lavatory, and collect the work they need during the detention period. Teachers also need a few minutes to take care of errands before staying until 5:30 p. m.

Question: Why aren't students informed of this rule before they find themselves faced with detention?

Answer: Students have been informed of the rule, by way of the public address system.

Question: I think this is absurd for students who ride a bus couldn't this be done activity period?

Answer: Students and teachers both have regular assignments during activity period, it is impossible to do it at this time; detention means being detained or holding back, not reassigned.

Question: Why should there be this detention; why not a curtailment of privileges and save this archaic punishment for habitual offenders?

Answer: This is aimed at habitual offenders, who cost our taxpayers considerable money with their absences, if some who are not the usual transgressors are guilty also they, too, must be punished.

Question: What is done during detention?

Answer: Two types of activity may be performed during this time — studying and homework.

Question: Why can there not be useful and sensible punishment for people who are late such as having them do something around the school: sweep halls, paint fixtures, refinish broken or damaged furniture, help teachers with grading or odd jobs in their rooms?

Answer: We have a maintenance crew at the school including students; it would be difficult to supervise a large number of students (10) working in different parts of the building for their detention; this type of punishment is given when a student defaces or damages school property; detention is given for infractions of the attendance law and disruption of the learning process.

Question: How do I get home when I have been given detention?

Answer: Transportation is provided for all students on detention at 5:30 p. m., by bus.

Question: May I be placed on detention more than once?

Answer: A student may and will be placed on detention each time he is deserving of it for the above stated reasons.

Question: What happens when I miss detention?

Answer: Each minute or assigned detention missed will result in two minutes of reassigned detention time.

I have asked these questions because I was assigned detention unaware that the procedure existed.

Pay attention to the answers I have been given so that you don't have a similar experience!
