Mrs. Kenneth Green received word this week that her son, Sgt. William Dugan left China September 7 enroute home.

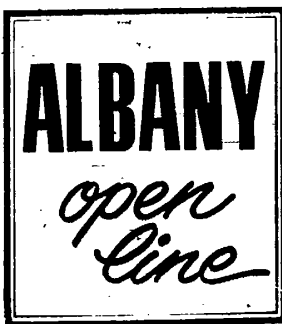
Word has been received that Bernard N. Bertrand C. Ph M is being discharged from the Navy this week.

Gov. Carey — and probably the legislature too — are preparing to take a very long walk off a short pier in the next couple of months.

The long walk is Carey's decision, if all else fails, to take up to \$4 billion in public employee pension funds if the federal government in New York City comes due at the end of December.

The short pier is the fact that based on past performance, it may be like throwing money down a rat hole, with the pensioners left holding the bag — an empty bag.

Carey says he will use the pension funds of the federal government continues to refuse to help the city, and investors continue to refuse to buy city bonds.

The plan is a safe one only if it ends the crisis in the city. But if the city needs still more money in February or March, then it's very risky indeed.

City Mayor Beame, whose attitude has had a lot to do with the refusal of private investors backs, to lend him money, appears to have finally woken up.

EASIER NOW TO REGISTER

In order to encourage a greater number of New York State citizens to take advantage of their voting privilege, several new measures have been passed by the Legislature and are now law. Among the most important of these is the ability to register by mail.

Due to the completion of technical procedures and record-keeping, this statute goes into effect on Dec. 1, 1975. From that time on New York residents will be permitted to register and enroll or to transfer their registration and enrollment by mail. Due to the effective date, this must be done by the voter in person for the upcoming election.

The State Board of Elections is currently working on administrative forms and procedures to be followed once the new "Post Card Registration" Law goes into effect. As a result of this convenient registration method, many more people will take advantage of the opportunity to cast their ballot.

A related law provides that a voter whose registration card is lost or misplaced from the registration poll may sign an affidavit as to voting qualifications and proceed to vote on a paper ballot. That ballot will then be sealed and delivered in a marked envelope to the central county board of elections which will count the vote if the voter's qualifications are verified in the central registration records.

Another new statute which already went into effect the beginning of this month eliminates the necessity for separate registration for general elections and school district elections. Under this law, the central county registration list which has been compiled up to 10 days before school district elections will be used as an official registration roster. Any voter whose name appears on that list will not be required to register specifically for school board elections.

Beginning with the November election, inspectors and official election clerks will be required to wear badges at the polls. This will help to facilitate voters in quickly identifying officials to answer questions or to obtain assistance.

Absentee balloting will also be permitted in special elections, as well as in primary and general elections. The purpose of the new Election Law changes will result in bringing out more people at election time by simplifying the procedures involved in exercising the most important public right in our democracy.
