

## GREENWOOD NEWS

### HOW TO GET MORE OUT OF GOING TO CHURCH

A man asked his friend "How come you know that man?" His friend answered, "Oh, he sleeps in the same pew with me!"

You may not sleep in any pew or even keep awake in any. You and I should emulate the example of the greatest person. Of him it is written that "He went to the Synagogue as his custom was on the Sabbath day." (Luke 4:16, RSV). If he needed the worship and instruction and fellowship provided by the church of his people and time, we need it more. This means participation in the public worship of God in the church on Sunday.

Do you ever say, "Well, I don't seem to get any thing out of it." Did you ever ask yourself, "How much do I put into it?" ## Legal Notice

### Notice Of Public Hearing

NOTICE IS HERBY GIVEN that a public hearing is to be held in the County Legislators' Room in the County Court House, Belmont, New York, on October 14, 1975 at 1:30 P. M. in connection with a proposed local law entitled "A Local Law In Relation To The Provision Of Mass Transportation Services", the text of which is as follows:

§ 1. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the county of Allegany that adequate, safe and efficient transportation facilities and services at reasonable cost to the residents of the county are essential to the growth of the county and the well being of its residents.

§ 2. In order to assure the provision of mass transportation services within the county of Allegany, the Allegany county board of legislators is hereby authorized to enter into a contract or contracts for a fair and reasonable consideration for mass transportation services to be rendered to the public by a privately-owned or operated mass transportation facility or facilities.

§ 3. For the purpose of maintaining transportation services at levels of performance determined by the Allegany county board of legislators, the said board is hereby authorized to appropriate such sums of money as it may deem proper for the operation of the mass transportation system, or any part thereof, in the county of Allegany and to provide that all or part of the aforementioned fund and reasonable consideration shall be in the form of capital equipment to be furnished to and used and maintained by such privately owned or operated mass transportation facility.

§ 4. This local law shall take effect immediately.
