To The Editor:

A reply dated August 29, 1975 was finally received from the Albany Office of New York State Department Environmental Conservation, in reply to my letter of June 28, 1975 regarding qualification of the Village of Richburg for flood insurance. Since then, more correspondence has been exchanged, and although agreement in principle was obtained at a September 22, 1975 meeting, the important question of when remains unanswered. We have a reprieve from the sanction of mortgage financing until January 1, 1976, and if EnCon acts as agreed in the near future the problem will be over and the matter closed.

Should EnCon fail to act expeditiously however, legal recourse is available by an Article 78 proceeding of state law requiring public officials to perform the duties of their office. It will be a sad state of affairs indeed, if it becomes necessary to resort to litigation to compel a state agency to fulfill an obligation of state law.

We would prefer cooperation, but will act firmly and appropriately to gain qualification via the Marshall Law only.

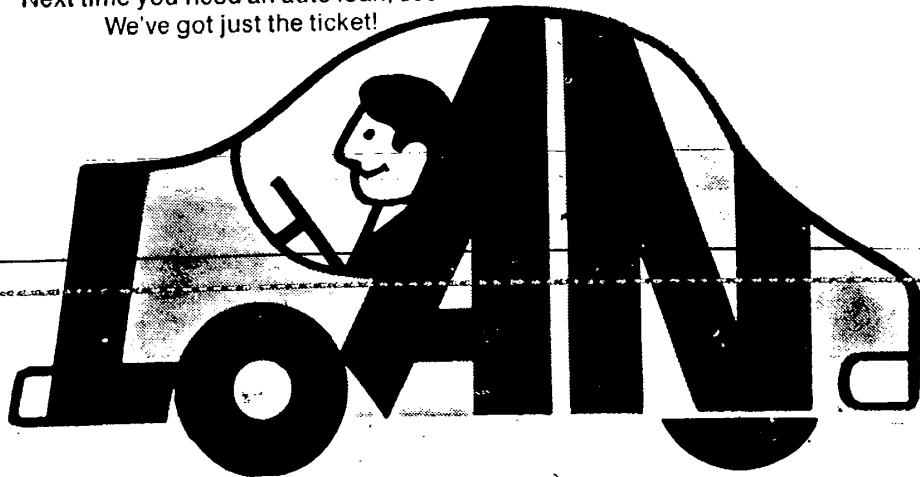
