Well Folks, now that the "battle of the seasons" is over with after last week's freeze, we can change our occupation from gardening to raking leaves. And, as a result of our first big freeze, we can expect changes in prices of produce as well as many other items.

In our specials this week, beef heads the list in the meat department with Chuck Roast at 79¢ per pound; Center Cut Chuck Roast at 99¢; and Boneless Chuck Roast at \$1.29; with Ground Chuck at 99¢. Standing Rib Roast is \$1.79 a pound; Red & White Luncheon Meats are 99¢ a pound; Sugarale Braunschweiger is 69¢ per lb., by the pieces; and Red & White Wieners are 59¢ for a 12-oz. pkg.

Seven Farms Ice Cream is 69¢ for 1/2 gallon; Mrs. Filbert's Margarine is 39¢ a lb.; and a carton of 8-16-oz. bottles of Coca Cola is 88¢.

In the grocery department we are having a canned good \$1 Sale with Hunt's Pears or Peaches at 3 15-oz. cans for \$1; Del Monte Corn, either cream style or whole kernel, 3 one lb. cans \$1; Hunt's Tomato Paste at 4-6-oz cans \$1; and Blue Boy Kidney Beans at 3-15-oz. cans for \$1.

In the Produce Department Cortland or McIntosh Apples are 10¢ a lb. or \$3.49 a bushel; Bananas are 15¢ per lb.; homegrown Cabbage is 10¢ a pound; and large green Peppers are 2 for 25¢.
