Notice is hereby given that the undersigned collector of Andover Central School has received the list and warrant for the collection of school taxes in and for such District and that we will receive voluntary payments during the regular banking hours at the Citizens National Bank & Trust Co., in Andover.

We have been instructed by the Board of Education to collect all taxes free of fees from September 5th to October 6th, 1975. The next thirty days (30) to add 2 percent in compliance with Chapter 687, print 3215 of the Education Laws of the State of New York which provides that the tax returns to the county treasurer must be made on or before September 15, 1975, the last date.

No renewal of tax without notice expires November 6, 1975 unless made.
