Next Tuesday, November 4, 1975 is ELECTION, and, despite the fact that we haven't heard from the County or received any information about the ballot, we know that there is a proposed Proposition, and several proposed Amendments that will be on the ballot — and should be voted on by voters.

Here is how we feel about these items:

Proposition No. 1: Housing Bond Issue. We say NO to this since the State (and we Taxpayers) are already carrying more debt than we can handle.

Amendment No. 1: Equal Rights Amendment (ERA). This is strictly a "gut" issue that has its pro's and con's so, vote the way you feel!

Amendment No. 2: Removal Censure, Suspension or Retirement of Judges or Justices. We say Yes since there should be some process to retire there people when they won't retire voluntarily.

Amendment No. 3: Administration and Financing of the Courts. We say NO since there are too many questions unsettled in the issue.

Amendment No. 4: Extraordinary Sessions of the Legislature. Our answer is YES as this would take some of the absolute power away from one man — the Governor.

Amendment No. 5: Certain Storm Water Sewer Systems and Indebtedness Therefor. We say YES — as long as local people can vote on the issue.

Amendment No. 6: Exclusions from Local Tax Limitations. We say NO as we believe the local property tax is already overburdened.
