There was competition in politics Tuesday. The Democrats put up Erwin Allen as Town Justice, who pulled in 203 votes to beat Stanley Murray, the incumbent. Mr. Murray has served the Town for 30 years and received 129 votes losing by 74 votes. James Feenoughy ran for Councilman on the Democrat ticket, receiving 101 votes and losing to Republican. Burdette Hulse who got 226 votes. Hulse takes the place of Neil McCormick, who did not choose to run. He had held the office for 15 years. Assessor of four years Peter McKenna ran against Gerald Mullen losing by 63 votes. McKenna got 126 and Mullen 189. Assessor for two years, Charles Wright Democrat got 115 votes losing to Barbara Mills who got 156 votes. She takes the place of Ross Woodworth who didn't run. She didn't have time to get in her Republican Petition so ran as a Square Deal Candidate. Bernice Osmin Democrat, opposed Winifred Simons and won the office of Collector by 210 to 117. Other unopposed Candidates were: John Helgeson, Supervisor 269; Marjorie York, Town Clerk, 266; Edward Mullen, Supt of Highways 223. County Offices were: Sheriff Jack Lisi, 243 votes against Arthur Laenen 66; Childron Latham County Clerk 225; Sander Benedek Corner 223; Robert S. Drake Co. Supervisor, Dist. 13, 233.

The Proposition lost to 38 Yes, 159 No. All Amendments lost: 1 Yes 66, No 138; 2 Yes 67, No 123; 3 Yes, No 143; 4 Yes 52, No 152; 5 Yes 42, No 137; 6 Yes 41, No 140; 7 Yes 94, No 99.

The Election Board: Geraldine Lewis, Chairman; Jennie White Mary Teresa McCormick and Paddy Heckman (substituting for Bernice Osmin) recorded 343 votes. Town Clerk Marjorie York went to Bath Saturday to get the supplies and took the returns back to Bath, Wednesday. Machine Custodian Stanley Holt read the votes.
