New Teacher

There seem to be more than the usual few young, pretty teachers in Andover Central this year. One of them is twenty-one year old Miss Carolynne Ruggiero. (I go by the nickname "Reggie"), second grade teacher, who comes to us from Long Island, New York, and more recently from Alfred University where she majored for four years in elementary education and minored in art.

When I interviewed Miss Ruggiero after school on Friday, Halloween day, she was appropriately decked out in a costume consisting of farmer overalls, flannel shirt, and plastic mask, looking rather comical with her dark brown hair tucked up into a small green ski hat rather than hanging slightly below her shoulders in its usual pretty curls. Dark brown eyes sparkling, she seemed to have enjoyed the chaotic afternoon.

Being from the city, Andover's atmosphere is quite a change but she loves it. In contrast to the kids from the city, Miss Ruggiero said she noticed that our fun is much more subdued and that we seem to enjoy school and life in general more than they. Another drastic difference is that "everyone knows everyone else; everyone is so helpful and friendly. I'd like to always teach in a town like Andover," she said. This seems to me that she meant to stay in teaching. "Oh, yes," she said, "I wouldn't even consider anything else! Teaching has so much more meaning than any other job." She'd like to remain in Andover for awhile, and particularly in the lower grades, where the students accept and return affection so much more readily. I consider myself quite lucky," she explained "to have such a small class (15 students). Its so much more personal. I really feel like I'm teaching them something." One of Miss Ruggiero's favorite methods of teaching is encouraging the students to be honest in expressing how they feel about their room, their classes, and other people.

Among her other interests are drawing, ceramics, macrame work, baseball, football, lacrosse and most of all travelling. She loves people. "There's so much variety! People will always be interesting!" Miss Ruggiero spent last summer in Cape Cod and plans to travel to California this summer - "If she can afford it". Another interest she expressed is to get into the auto mechanics course either at BOCES or in Alfred as she just bought a new car and would like to be as self-sufficient in its upkeep as possible.

Miss Ruggiero comes from a family of four children of which she is the eldest. "The oldest always tries things first, making all the big mistakes and is much more protected." Being the oldest, having to set an example for younger kids, isn't new to her. She loves dealing with people so she should never get bored with teaching. Miss Ruggiero practice taught in Andover last year, before coming as a fulltime teacher this year, so it's a little late to welcome her to our halls. But we'll welcome you anyway. Best of luck to you in your travels and your time in Andover.
