NOTHING MORE
An old legend tells about the Apostle John, one of the inner circle of Jesus' followers. This legend tells us that John lived the longest of any of the Apostles. He alone died a natural death. Venerated and liked by the people of his village, the old man often asked by others to tell them again about his great Master. He had known the Galilean Teacher personally. But as he grew very old, John would only say, "Little children, love one another." Repeatedly they urged him to tell them something new. What about the Master's teachings, miracles, wonders. At last the old man said "Little children, love one another." There is nothing more.

It does sound a little too simple, and it needs thinking to know how to love wisely and well—especially across barriers of pride and animosity and prejudice and jealousy.

You and I soon learn that love is more than romance, more than love between man and woman (although love embraces all of these); love is something you must do. Love makes changes in our behavior, in our values. Love makes us want to forgive those who have wronged us, hurt us. Love casts out all kinds of fear.

Remember that lovely scene in Charles Dickens' book, "Tale of Two Cities" when the brave hero was taking the place of another and was going to the guillotine? Beside him sat a girl, little more than a child. On the way to the execution she said, "If I may ride with you, will you let me hold your hand? I am not afraid, but I am very small, and it will give me courage." They rode together her hand in his. Fear left her eyes and soul. She looked up into his face and said, "I think you have been sent to me from heaven." Love casts out all kinds of fear.

"We know that we have crossed the frontier from death to life because we do love our brothers—My children, let us love not merely in theory or in words—let us love in sincerity and in practice!" (1 John 3:14, 18, Phillips).
