

"Inside The State Capital"

By James L. Emery CURTAILMENT NOT TAXES

With the latest pronouncements from Albany, it sounds like a re-peat performance is in the offing About one year ago, after promis-ing no tax increases when he was ampaigning, Governor Carey recommended large tax increases on business to balance his budget. These taxes were soundly beaten back by the Legislature and now the Governor is calling for \$800 million and the control of the control o million plus in new taxes.

Don't be fooled fo ra minute

Don't be fooled fo ra minute—taxes on business and banks affect all of us. As a matter of fact, it could further hurt our economic picture and put even more neople out of work.
During the recent Legislative Session I chaired a Task Porce on Taxation and the State's Econor. V. Repeatedly we were told by the business community that they couldn't stand added tax burdens. It was pointed out by many that industries would leave for other states.

A certified public accountant testified: "I and my colleagues of other public accounting firms find that the executives of the businesses we serve seem to have only one topic on their minds — these days, and that is high taxes. I regret and am alarmed to say that we have received so many requests from our business clients on how to become "non-residents" of the State of New York for tax purposes, that we have to prepare a checklist of things to do to accomplish this."

The testimony of the Director of Public Affairs for the Associated Industries of New York State Inc. added: "Over 370.000 manufacturing jobs have left since 1948—Since 1965, the State has lost more than 200,000 jobs. In the same 26 year period. Californigained in excess of 940,000 manufacturing jobs; Ohio, over 140.000; and Illinois, over 100,000."

And a representative of Ciffzens Public Expenditure Survey. Inc summarized it this way: "New York State is in an economic wai with neighboring states for industry. When industries leave New York their destination is most frequently one of our neighboring

York their destination is most frequently one of our neighboring states. New Jersey gets 50% of the migration, followed by Connecticut with 10% and Pennsylvannia with 9% — New York State and local taxes are already 24% higher than Connecticut, 43% higher than in New Jersey and 54% higher than in Pennsylvania.
