We have become sylfishly indifferent and even presumptuous and consequently take too much for granted naturally and supernaturally.

A theological principle tells us that the supernatural is built on the natural, that grace presupposes nature. The material and spiritual, though distinct, are not separated, split dichotomies. On the contrary, they are inter-connected and inter-twined realities. If in our natural life we "hide" our gratitude to men, then is there any wonder that in our life of the spirit we forget to expredict thanks to men, though distinct in their own ways, are not polarized antituses. They are just two different sides of the one coin of reality, of the one virtual we must constantly, always and everywhere, not just once in a while express and shot our thanks to God and people. We must CULTIVATE this habit of saying thank-you every day.
