Math Contest

On Saturday, November 22, the Alfred University Science Center was the site of the Eighth Annual William Varick Nevins High School Mathematics Contest. Contestants from ten different area high schools competed for a first prize of \$25 plus a \$500 scholarship to Alfred University.

The test was given in two parts, both in the morning. The first of which was multiple choice questions, the second requiring more substantial answers. The test was followed by a free luncheon in Alfred's Ade Hall, for all contestants and accompanying teachers. During the afternoon a presentation by a guest speaker enabled teachers and competitors to grade the tests and arrive at final scores, which were announced after the speaker. The first place position was taken by a student from Pioneer Central School; a student from Hornell and another from Canaseraga tied for second place; and fourth was taken by David Hardy of Alfred-Almond (who was formerly a student here at ACS).

Only two Andover students participated, Anita Winslow and Bill Walker. Their scores aren't known at present, but they may gain automatic acceptance at Alfred University, a prize given to the top twenty scorers.

One note of interest — one of the two students who tied for second place was wearing a football jersey with the number seventy-six on it. Is a senior, so his graduation year will be 1976 and his test score was seventy-six out of one hundred and twenty. Now there's something to ponder!
