## Iroquois Telephone Seeks **Increased Rates**

Iroquois Telephone filed a rate proposal with the New York Pub-lice Service Commission on No-vember 28, 1975

Morris Peelle, District Commercial Manager for Iroquois Telephone, said "If our rate proposal is approved, the maximum increase is approved, the maximum increase for any residential customer would be around \$.18 per day for basic individual line service, and \$.43 per day for individual line business service. Other changes would change the extension telephone rate of \$1.50 for residence and \$2.50 month for business extension. In addition, we're seeking \$2.50 month for business extension. In addition, we're seeking increases in service connection charges and in other supplemental services and equipment.

Peelle stressed that those are proposed increases, and may or may not be the ones that are finally put into effect. The Public Service Commission will study the company's case and issue an order sometime in the future.
