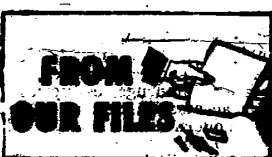

He married Lillian Lee on June 24, 1903, who with one son, Enos; one daughter, Virginia Lee; one brother, Charles and one sister, Mrs. Gertrude B. Scott survives. Burial was in Woodlawn Cemetery.

Rushford property values have risen since the Mohawk Valley Power Company of Rochester has commenced building a large dam and lake which will be used for the storage of water power purposes. It is understood that the lake will be used as a summer resort. The lake will cover approximately 50,000 acres of land including all of East Rushford, the Rush Creek Valley, the gorge as well into the Village of Rushford itself actually taking part of the village. The State Highway will be included and a new road will be built around the lake to the right of the old road. The lake will be three times as large as Cuba Lake and several times deeper at the head. It will store enough water so that if it were let loose it would wash out Canadea and surrounding towns below the lake.
