The proposed rates are detailed on a summary sheet filed with the Commission and affect currently filed P. S. C. — N. Y. — No. 6.

The proposed schedule will increase revenues by approximately \$999,500 or 35.3 percent above the level generated for the 12 months ended August 31, 1975. However, the proposed schedule will affect individual service and charges by different percentages.
