Inside The State Capital

CREDIBILITY IS THE KEY WORD

In his fourth State-of-the-State Address, Governor Carey seems to pronounce that the days of fiscal crisis are over for New York State. The Governor says he will seek tax cuts and, at the same time, new spending programs. These first official words of the Governor in 1978, an election year, immediately raised the one issue which has undermined the Governor since his first days in office - his obvious lack of credibility.

In 1974, when then Congressman Carey was campaigning for the Governor's chair, he said he would not raise taxes if elected. But as his first act he sought an \$800-Million tax increase which included the proposal for a 10-cent per gallon tax increase on gasoline. We were able to block the outrageous gas tax proposal, however the Governor did force through a \$600-million tax package.

I can also vividly recall Governor Carey's 1977 State-of-the-State address in which he said he was going to reduce welfare costs by a half-billion dollars. He gained big headlines throughout the state, but when it came time to put his words into deeds, the Governor ran away from his promise.

It is against this background pattern that the Governor's 1978 remarks are now being assessed. I am sure a major tax cut package will be enacted this year and I will be pleased to see the people regain some of the additional \$600-million in taxes the Governor has taken from them in each of the first three years of his administration. I am also glad the Governor has been willing to adopt a plank from the Republican platform which has been espousing major tax reductions so that we can begin the job of rebuilding our state's economy.

However, I must express my serious concern regarding the Governor's stated objectives of increasing state spending for new programs. The loss of 275,000 jobs in the last three years because of high taxes applied to excessive state spending is clear evidence of the fact that New York can't afford to expand state government. We need to reduce state bureaucracy if we are to have a chance to economically rebuild our state.

The Governor himself said, "the future of this State lies not in needless public spending, but in private growth." Well, Mr. Carey, we can't have our cake and eat it too. We can't hope to increase the number of jobs in this state and to make New York State a better place in which to live if we continue to drive up the cost of state government. You must make a choice, even in this election year, if you ever hope to bring some credibility back to state government operations.

Statements of something for everyone heralding a return of the "days of wine and roses" undermine all of the efforts being made to set New York on a more sound economic and fiscal course. Such statements can lead only to more broken promises and greater disappointments.
