Alfred Ag-Tech Offers Defensive Driving Course

Area drivers can wipe out as many as three penalty points from their licenses by successfully completing a defensive driving course being offered at Alfred State Agricultural and Technical College.

Enrollment for the eight-hour evening course is now being accepted by the Office of Continuing Education, according to a spokesman who said registration must be completed by Monday, Feb. 6, in the business technologies building. The course is scheduled for three consecutive Tuesday evenings beginning Feb. 14. Sessions will start at 7 p. m. and there will be an exam on the final night.

The instructor is William Moss, supervisor with the department of public safety at Alfred State College. He said persons successfully completing the program may earn up to three credit points to counter penalty points received against their driver's licenses.
