"Inside The State Capital"

Public opinion polls show that over 85 per cent of the residents of New York State favor the enactment of a constitutionally acceptable death penalty.

Last year the Legislature passed a broad death penalty statute, but it was vetoed by Governor Carey.

Recent decisions rendered by the Supreme Court have cleared the way for the drafting of a constitutionally acceptable death penalty statute, and the State Legislature is moving toward another attempt at enacting a capital punishment law in New York State.

While others have been copying and watering down last year's final version of death penalty legislation, the Assembly Republican Minority has been carefully reappraising and examining all possible legal and policy problems. Draft after draft has been proposed, examined and rewritten.

The result is a bill which was introduced last week. The number of that bill is Assembly 9741, and I am pleased to announce that I am a co-sponsor of this important measure.

The new capital punishment proposal provides for eight different circumstances under which the death penalty sentence could be handed down to persons who have demonstrated an absolute contempt for human life.

These circumstances include: --when the defendant is to receive a payment for the murder; --when the motive is to prevent a witness to a crime from testifying; --when a kidnap victim is murdered;

--when means of a murder create a substantial risk of death to many persons; --when the victim is tortured to death;

--when the purpose of the murder is to avoid arrest or to escape custody; --when the defendant has murdered two or more persons; and --when the defendant has been convicted of a prior murder or convicted of two or more felonies involving the use of a weapon or the infliction of injury.

This bill has been carefully drafted so as to meet all requirements by the courts including provisions to exclude the possibilities of prejudice towards a defendant and to institute every possible safeguard to prevent any error.

The bill compels juries to consider mitigating circumstances before imposing a final sentence, and it creates the special procedure for direct review of all death sentences by the state's highest court.

The enactment of a wide ranging death penalty statute will be one of the most important issues considered during the present legislative session.

Despite the Governor's veto threats, I believe the chances are good that the public's intent will be carried out.
