

## Lions Contribute To Ye Hubbard's Cupboard

Many of Andover's Senior Citizens use this store as an outlet for the sale of their Crafts products to help supplement their "existence income."

In other business, the Lions voted to:

Purchase a "sound booth" for the Andover Central School to be used for the hearing tests. (Cost not to exceed \$1,700).

Purchase an "Otoscope" for the Andover Central School which is used in conjunction with hearing examinations at a cost of \$74.

Spend \$200 for films on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse which will be shown in Allegany County Schools.

Lions Members then heard from Past President Don Baker who reported that the Allegany-Steuben County Maple Producers agreed to more actively participate in this year's 6th Annual Maple Festival. Plans from President James Bliss who reported that the Maple Festival plans were progressing nicely for April 1 & 2, 1978.

Jerry Sherman, CPA and Tax Counselor from Wellsville then presented a program covering the changes in the "1977 Income Tax" laws.

Chairman Ken Milligan then reported that the final sales count on the "Giant Coloring Books" totaled 2,208 — of which the Lions donated 20 books to the Harrison Valley Children's Home.

Christmas Tree Pickup Chairman Clint Buncy reported that 4 Lions spent 16 manhours to complete this project.

Lion Carmen Ceglia then reported that 56 children in the Andover Area received Christmas presents through the Lions "Toys For-Tots" X-Mas Program.

And, after explaining the program we asked him if our tenant would qualify under the program to have the storm doors and windows installed. He stated that he would stop by with an application for her to fill out and if she qualified under the program, that they would take care of it. And eventually she did as they came to us to sign a release as some owner before they could do any work.

Thus, after our tenant came home to her apartment in January after the Christmas vacation, the necessary papers were signed and the work completed in short order in a very satisfactory manner.

That should have been the end of a very happy story as the Senior Citizen was very happy with the prospect of saving money on her gas bills in the future — and the organization had successfully accomplished another one of their missions.

Now enters the "heavy" in the story that could have been motivated by jealousy, hate, spite gossip — or what have you! Yep a local carpenter drove, by while the door and window installation were in progress and reported at the Village Office (according to the grape-vine) that the C.E.T.A. Employees were working on the Mayor's house.

Fact 1 — the C.E.T.A. Employees were actually working on the Village Garage (which can be very easily proven by 8 witnesses).

Secondly — Anyone with two eyes should have been able to see a noticeable difference in the workers as the Housing Action Corporation Employees had full beards while the C.E.T.A. Employees didn't.

## The Mayor's Column

After a few weeks silence, perhaps, its time to give a brief report on a few things.

The construction of the new Village Garage was completed on schedule with the Overhead Door Company of Havel, scheduled to install the two overhead doors that had to be ordered special as soon as they arrive from the factory. The cement block building has been built on as an addition to our existing one is approximately 26' by 52' and is large enough to house all four Village Vehicles that had been sitting out doors the past year.

Charles Gavin, local stone-mason, laid up the cement blocks and supervised the construction of the building with four C.E.T.A. funded local employees under the general supervision of our Village Superintendent. And, of great importance to the Village Taxpayers, the entire project was done at a cost of only around \$6,000 to local taxpayers which is less than a third of what a metal building would have cost for the same size.

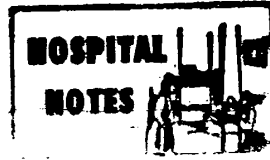
As far as the maintenance of the Village Streets in reference to snow plowing and snow removal is concerned, it appears to be the consensus of opinion of most residents of our 3-man Village Crew have done an excellent job with the equipment that they have had to work with. And, for the benefit of residents who don't know what this equipment consists of — we have an old Ford dump truck that has a hydraulically operated snow-plow on front, a load of sand and a sander on back. The hydraulic cylinder had broken in previous years and had been welded. This year the cylinder broke again and in order to save time we had it welded again so the plow was out of order for just one day. How ever, since the cylinder is aluminum it just couldn't stand the pressure and blew up again. This time in order to get the plow back on the streets as soon as possible we had to purchase a whole new hydraulic unit as it could not be taken several months to get just the cylinder ordered from the factory. This time again the plow was only laid up for just one day in order to replace the unit. But both times the plow was broken down was when the crew was plowing snow and when we needed it the most.

This year over 100 dump truck loads of snow were removed from Main Street by our Village Crew with the Staff Crew very kindly giving us an "assist" on the blind corners in the interest of "Public Safety".

Here again we ran into problems with equipment in previous years, the Village had contracted with a private dump truck operator to remove the snow with his truck. However, two years ago there was an unfortunate accident involving this truck so that it was not available for the Village use last year and thus there was no snow removed from Main Street last year.

Since the human memory is rather short at times and since we had no knowledge of the accident a couple of years ago, when we went to make arrangements for this truck — we found it had even been licensed this year. Thus it took several days for the owner to get it fixed up to pass inspection, insured, and licensed so we could use it to haul snow away.

Then when we used it the first time the driver reported trouble with the rear brakes and said that it wasn't safe to be operated any longer until fixed. So here again we had to make alternate plans. Fortunately, we were able to make arrangements with Jack Joyce a local resident, and with the cooperation of the Town of Andover in the use of their old dump truck, we were able to complete the project. However, in pursuing this limited effort, we have already exceeded the funds budgeted by several hundreds of dollars. So let's hope for no more big snowfalls this year — the budget just can't stand it!
