FORMATION OF INDEPENDENT FISH AND WILDLIFE COMMISSION

The New York State Conservation Council, dissatisfied with the Department of Environmental Conservation's growing involvement in regulatory matters, has called for the formation of a separate and independent Fish and Wildlife Commission.

The council recently adopted a resolution calling for the separate commission to be governed by five commissioners, one from each of the state's five wildlife districts.

Members of the conservation council criticized Environmental Conservation Commissioner Peter A. A. Berle for being both "arrogant" and "inaccessible."

They also stressed that the position of fish and wildlife on the scale of DEC's environmental concerns is low. The DEC, they claim, has become less attuned to the service concept that has been traditional in the relationship between the license-buying sportsmen and the Fish and Wildlife Division. Sportsmen feel that environmentalists are making fish and wildlife decisions based on a preservationist philosophy rather than the conservation principle of "wise use."

To achieve the objectives of the dissatisfied conservation council, legislation has been introduced to establish an independent Fish and Wildlife Commission.

This legislation would seem to be in the best interest of the sportsmen in New York State as a step to restore priority to their concerns.

Over the years, DEC workers have divided into those concerned with wildlife management and others concerned with pollution abatement and protection of endangered species.

The new Fish and Wildlife Commission would be solely concerned with the fish and wildlife resources of our state. It would provide the full-time attention and program direction that cannot be expected from a Commissioner and a Department whose principal concern is with the human environment and whose function has become one principally of regulation and enforcement.

I would appreciate hearing your comments on the formation of the Fish and Wildlife Commission.
