UPGRADING THE TAP PROGRAM

During the past three years, the administration of TAP awards has been a nightmare for students, their parents and the state's colleges. Applications processing has been exceedingly slow, and TAP award payments have been delayed, thereby putting unnecessary financial pressures on students and parents and colleges.

The administrative problems still exist with students having not yet received their TAP awards for the 1977 fall semester which has already been completed.

To deal with these problems, Assembly Republicans under the leadership of Minority Leader Perry D. Duryea have introduced legislation to provide a more effective eligibility verification of TAP award applicants and to develop an evaluation program monitoring the state's response to eligible students who experience long delays and errors in the processing of their TAP grants.

The legislation introduced also calls for increases in the TAP award payment schedule, bringing the program in line with today's costs.

A \$60-million increase would be made over the next four years, with \$11.8 million already appropriated in the TAP budget a year ago and \$8 to \$10 million to be gained by tougher eligibility verification requirements.

Maximum awards to students attending independent colleges and universities would be increased by as much as \$350, while awards to students attending the lower cost state supported schools would be increased by a minimum of 20 percent.

A provision of the legislation also would benefit students attending the State University system by phasing out the \$200 million mandated reduction in awards to upper division students.

Additionally, the SUNY Health Services Fee imposed last year would be eliminated at a savings of \$2.3 million for students.

TAP award increases are long overdue. The costs of a college education are rising rapidly and students and their families need help to meet the added burdens.

The Tuition Assistance Program was designed to aid lower and middle income families in providing their children with a college education and we must ensure that the program does not become ineffective due to administrative errors or out of date award levels.

The Assembly Republican-TAP reform plan which I am co-sponsoring would ensure administrative improvements and more realistic award payments to assist the deserving students and their parents with the mounting financial burdens of a college education.
