State The State Capital

New York State residents are finding it more and more difficult to meet the costs of heating their homes, particularly during the severe winters we've experienced the last two years.

One of the ways that we in the Legislature can provide some relief is to lift the onerous four per cent sales tax on home heating fuels. More simply put, this tax means that four cents on every dollar paid for any type of fuel used to heat the homes goes to the state. For this reason, I and other Republican legislators have mounted several efforts to get this unfair tax repealed.

It should be said right here that the sales tax was never meant to be imposed on the purchase of anything other than luxury items. We all know that there is no way in the world that a warm home can be considered anything other than a vital necessity.

That's why this burdensome tax must be lifted and that's why I joined my Republican Assembly colleagues last week in forcing a vote to free a repeal bill from the Ways and Means Committee where it has been bottled up.

We want the bill brought before the full house so that every member can vote on the merits of the legislation. I am sorry to say that this effort was beaten by the majority Democrats' argument that the sales tax was "protecting the people from windfall profits by the oil industry." THIS WAS A RIDICULOUS ARGUMENT.

Repeal of this tax is a fight we've mounted several times. But the Assembly leadership refuses to release it from committee even though the bill was passed last year by the Senate.

We have tried to get the legislation out of committee through a parliamentary procedure called "motion to discharge." This is the route we chose last week and not only do we Democrats oppose the bill, they won't even let it out of committee and on to the floor of the Assembly for a fair debate on its merits.

This effort has been defeated even though the people have made themselves perfectly clear on the issue by returning the thousands of petitions we have circulated throughout the state. And there has not been ONE person who has voiced opposition to saving the average household precious money to keep their family comfortable and healthy while the winter gales are howling and the snow storms are burying our communities.

The people want this tax cut and they deserve it. What is just as important, they want it and they deserve it NOW - not at some unknown future time - and not just a cosmetic reduction of one part of the tax. The people are entitled to get complete relief from this tax.
