Greenwood Central School Board of Education voted at the Monday night meeting, to give students an extra day of Easter recess and added Thursday, March 23 to the long weekend. There had been an extra day kept open if needed for snow day closing and this wasn't used. The Board met with Chaparrones for the Senior Trip and discussed rules and regulation for the Washington, D. C. trip to be made at Spring Vacation April 14-21. Steve Kickbush was appointed Coach for the Track program and Jeanne Hollenbeck was appointed Assistant Coach. The Board approved purchase of a mixer for the Cafeteria and minor renovations to the Home Economics Room. These will include shelves and work space additions and are not expected to exceed \$500 in cost. The Board awarded a roofing repair contract to Peterson Roofing Co. of Olean. The repairs will be in the roof over the Cafeteria, Shop and Music Room areas of the main building. An investigation will be made of the advantages of the school district purchasing of a telephone, the inter-communication system instead of renting it. The Board discussed conditions on the Athletic Field especially in the

Fall and will secure cost estimates of installation of drainage tile. Approval was given for contracting for the same services as were contracted this school year including data processing, instructional television, film library, payroll and census. The Board approved the employment of Mrs. Barbara Wallace as school typist under the County Manpower Employment Program.
