## "Inside The State Capital" By James L. Emery

Work on a compromise death penalty measure was completed last week and the bill received favorable committee votes in both houses of the State Legislatures. This clears the way for early passage of a capital punishment bill by the legislature and an attempt to override the anticipated gubernatorial veto.

The compromise measure con-

The compromise measure con-The compromise measure conforms almost entirely to the death penalty proposal previously offered by the Assembly Republican Minority. The new version adopts our concept of aggravating circumstances and the really important provision of making the death penalty applicable to murders which were committed in the course of another serious felony, such as rape.

rape.

I feel the death penalty measure I feel the death penalty measure now before us is a tough and fair proposa'. Safeguards are built in so that life is not taken in those cases where there is a question of doubt about the appropriateness of the ultimate punishment, and the death penalty would be properly handed down in those cases of violent murders where the offender demonstrates absolute contempt for human life.

There are 10 circumstances un-

derivisitates are to for human life.

There are 10 circumstances under which the sentence of death could be handed down. They are:

-Murder when the victim, or intended victim, was a police

officer on duty;
-murder when the victim, or intended victim, was a correctional employee on duty;
-murder by an escaped prisoner or an inmate serving a life sentence;

life sentence;
—murder to prevent a person from testifying about a crime;
—murder for hire;
—murder in the course of committing another serious felony such as rape, robbery, etc.;
—murder creating a substantial risk of death (such as bombing) to many persons;
—murder by torture;
—murder of two or more persons; and
murder committed by a per

sons; and murder committed by a per son previously convicted of intentionally causing death or serious physical injury to an other person.

The death penalty is one of the lost issues to face the State registrature and the Governor. I feel strongly that my position must be consistent with the people I represent. From my questionnaire polling of the 186th Assembly District, constituent, have voiced an overwhelming support as high as 83 per cent in favor of restoring the death penalty in New York State.

Other polls conducted by noted or ling services have shown that for the entire state, even in the more liberal sections of New York City, there is overwhelming support for restoring the death pen-

Strong legislation is needed to deal with the rising rate of violent crimes. The more lenicate—approaches have shown they do not show while past experience shows work, while past experience shows that the death penalty can be a deterrent to the ultimate crime

ieterrent to the ultimate crime. I should also note that we cannot allow ourselves to become trapped into letting this one strong action obscure the need for other sweeping changes in our mate's penal raws.

The crime control package proposed by the Assembly Republican Minority is a comprehensive program. It also deals with mandatory minimum sentences limita.

fram. It also deals with manna-tory minimum sentences. limita-tion of plea bargaining for serious felonies, the use of criminal sanc-tions for teenagers committing murders and other violent crimes and other necessary, tough provis-ions for reducing violent crime in state.

our state.

I hope these equally important features of our comprehensive anti-crime package will also gain the attention and support given to our death penalty measure.
