The Sacrament of Confirmation was conferred upon 38 teenagers and four adults from St. Joachim's Parish in Canisteo and St. Mary's Parish in Rexville during a combined Mass Tuesday morning, April 4 in St. Mary's Church. The Most Rev. Dennis W. Hickey D.D. Auxiliary Bishop of Rochester concelebrated the Mass of the Holy Spirit with the Rev. Thomas Burr Pastro of St. Mary's and St. Joachim's Churches; the Rev. Eugene G. Eno, Chaplain of St. James Mercy Hospital; the Rev. Donald F. Schwab, Associate Pastor of St. Ann's, Hornell and the Rev. Wm. Flynn of Rochester, wearing red robes, ornamented with the symbol of the Holy Spirit, members of the Class approached the altar, where Bishop Hickey and the Priests imposed hands upon them invoking the Holy Spirit to give them wisdom, understanding, courage, knowledge, reverence and love of God and their fellowmen. Mr. Williams announced that in all his years of experience he had been able to accomplish more with our boys and girls in less time than in any other town or city where he had trained bands. The band will play Saturday, August 13, 1927 at Harvest Home on the Presbyterian Church lawn, August 18, and the following Saturday evenings during August. There being no money appropriated or donated to meet the expense of this concert, any gifts will be gladly received. It was announced in one issue of The News that five businessmen responded.

A LESSON TO BE LEARNED

Just a week ago, two New York City policemen were killed in a sidewalk shootout. One of the men apprehended and charged with the murders is a man named Cleveland Davis.

Cleveland Davis has a long history of violent crime. His case history is another indication that the lenient attitude towards crime adopted by the governor and others, is unworkable and totally unacceptable.

Davis was convicted of armed robbery and sentenced to prison in another state. He escaped and came to New York. Here he committed another armed robbery, was caught and was sentenced. While in prison, he was involved in an uprising, was transferred to another facility, and then became a ringleader in a more serious matter - the Attica rebellion.

For his participation in the Attica hostilities, Davis was indicted on a charge of murder. This charge was later reduced to a charge of coercion. On being convicted of coercion he was sentenced to an additional four years in prison.

Before half of that additional term was served, Governor Carey took it upon himself to pardon Cleveland Davis and he returned to the streets.

We now have two dead police officers who leave grieving families behind because a man who should have been in back of bars was released too soon.

We need legislative action to prevent this same tragic mistake from happening again. It is high time the governor of this state took the lead and initiative in ridding our streets of criminals. It is time he began to support the causes of law and order which would properly deal with hard-core criminals.

As a first step, I believe the governor should sign the death penalty bill which is now on his desk. The majority of the people of the state support the restoration of capital punishment. The Legislature has properly heeded their wishes, but fair measure to deal with people who show all absolute contempt for human life. The governor should put personal feelings aside and act on behalf of the people who elected him.

Secondly, I urge the governor to adopt the comprehensive anticrime proposal offered by Assembly Republicans. This program deals with juvenile crime, plea bargaining, mandatory minimum sentences, and other necessary changes in our state's penal laws.

Finally, the governor should end his policy of dumping prisoners out onto the streets. It goes against every grain of common sense in our society today, and he ought to stop it.
