GOD'S NEGATIVES

Are all negatives bad? Even if they are negatives as we find them in the Scriptures? If our prayers are answered negatively, are they prove good for us, and not destructive are they bad? Let us look at a few scriptures, containing negatives we will find helpful rather than destructive.

First of all there is the negative of God's word which says I will, not fail you. Joshua, the first chapter and the fifteen verse. A. I was with Moses, so I will be with thee. I will not fail thee nor forsake thee. What the Lord is saying here is that as long as Joshua followed the teaching and healing of Moses, God would be with him, and would be his guide.
