There are some areas of decrease but the total budget is \$101,734 higher than last year or about an 8% increase. This should represent a \$7.00 increase per \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

A final reminder — each Board member is going to present one part of the Budget on May 2, 1978, at 7:30 in the gym. On May 3, 1978 between the hours of 12:00- 8:00 P. M. voting will take place in the foyer of the gym.

In addition to a budget vote, you will have an opportunity to vote on a new \$3 passenger bus for \$18,264.00, and one Board position.

Greenwood Central School Board of Education met Monday night and adopted a budget of \$822,734 to be presented to the District voters May 9. This is a five per cent increase over 1977-78 budget of \$781,525. The budget will include the purchase of a school bus under state contract. The purchase will appear as a line item in the budget and not as a separate resolution for voter approval. Also included is an increase in driver education reaching services from Steuben County Board of Cooperative Educational Services to offer the course more days a week to fill a backlog of student requests. The District has contracted for driver education on a 20% basis or one day a week in 1978-79 year will contract for driver education on a 60% basis or three days a week. It is expected the services will return to the 20% ratio in 1979-80 school year.

Virgil Husse was named Chairman of the Annual District Meeting May 9. A former District Superintendent of Schools, he has served as Chairman of the Greenwood Meetings for several years. John Hunt will be unopposed for reelection to a five year term on the Board. Glenn Stephens was approved as bus driver for the Senior Class Trip to Washington D. C. this week. Richard Smith and Mike Bronson were authorized to attend a basketball coaching clinic in Rochester May 5 and 6. Betty Hubertus was approved as a substitute teacher and Pat Hulse was approved as a non-teaching staff substitute.

The Board discussed an acoustical problem in the gymnasium, but decided to live with the problem because there are no funds available at this time to correct it. Proposed renovations in the home economics room were also tabled. The Board voted to participate in BCCES cooperative bidding for bread and paper products. The Greenwood Fire Department bid \$20 for an old cafeteria food mixer was accepted. The Board approved a contract with Communication System and approved the contract with Petersen Roofing Co., of Olean for roof repairs. The Board adopted the BCCES school calendar for 1978-79 and heard a bus report from Ernest Kinner school bus mechanic.

Greenwood Central School National Honor Society held an assembly Friday, April 7th, to induct new members. Howard Moore, President of the National Honor Society, acted as master of ceremonies. The GCS Jazz Ensemble played for the program. Lisa Reisman was soloist. Students are inducted into the Honor Society if they have displayed unusually high scholarship, leadership, character and service. The members held a candle lighting ceremony with each member lighting a candle, from large candles symbolizing scholarship, leadership

character and service. Sandra Dennison, secretary, led the group in the pledge. Howard Moore, the president, gave a certificate to each inductee while Mr. Gooley presented them with a pin. Then Principal Gooley congratulated the new members. Mr Gary Moore former Principal, spoke on education and life. Mrs. Loree Symonds and her home economics class served tea to the parents and guests.

Several people attended the Greenwood Town Board Meeting Monday night to request that a road that had been plowed up be restored and returned to the highway system. It is Road 18 known as the Rogers Road on West Greenwood Hill. The issue is whether the road had been permanently abandoned and who has the right of way. The request was presented by Attorney Philip Patti, retained by part of the group. He gave the petition with 126 signatures asking that the Rogers Road from the intersection with Town Road 2 to the intersection with Town Road 17 be reopened. The road is 1.25 mile in length.

A portion of the road has been plowed up by Neil McCormick as he owns land on both sides. Mr and Mrs. Albert Lounsberry had deeded 2 acres of land to their daughters Mr. and Mrs. Richard Nye of Jasper and Mr. and Mrs. John Murray of Bristow, Va., and they are denied access to their property because a portion of the road has been plowed up. Patti said this is clearly improper. The initial resolution in 1949 by the Town Board called for abandonment of three-fourths of a mile of the road. He questioned just a portion of the road and wanted to know on what basis it was abandoned. He said the Town still maintains the right of way and title unless proceedings were followed to return the road to adjoining landowners. He asked the Board to take action to see the roadbed is restored and directed the Town Highway Superintendent Ed Mullen to request the man who plowed up the roadbed to restore it to the natural condition before it was destroyed.

Town Supervisor, John Helgeron said the Town interpreted the road as being permanently abandoned since 1949. Patti said the road had been used enough that it could not be constituted as abandoned. Ed Mullen said it was his understanding the road was absolutely abandoned but there was no County record of the abandonment. He said a road not worked over a period of years is abandoned. Patti said even if it had not been maintained but had been used it could not be abandoned. Patti said one tenth of a mile had been used as an Erwin Project and if any portion of the road maintained the entire road must be maintained as a Town cannot seek funds for a road that doesn't exist. Town Councilman Laverne Stephens said that puts the Town in a difficult position and maybe an alternate route could be found. Patti said a resolution in 1975 when Mr. McCormick was a member of the Board, bound the Board to the position that the road would be left as it is and he did not have the title to the roadbed he had plowed. Ed Mullen said the Town had been receiving aid on 77 miles of Town Road. A study was made and the mileage reduced to 47 miles. He said when the State takes a road off the mileage as it has the Rogers Road, he had no legal right to touch a road classifi-

ed as abandoned, unless the Town orders him to do so. Mrs. Nye said they have a camper and her aunt and uncle have a house and they have traveled the road for ten years until last Fall. Mr. Helgeron said the Board would accept
