Inside The State Capital

It is indeed an expensive proposition to send a son or daughter to college these days: \$1,500 yearly for community college; \$2,500 for SUNY; and \$6,000 or more for private colleges and universities. If the state has the resources available to help taxpayers meet these expenses, we have a responsibility to see that they are offered.

For the first time, New York State residents who have dependent children in college may deduct a portion of the tuition costs from taxable state income.

Beginning with 1978 tax returns, a deduction will be allowed for tuition paid on behalf of each dependent in full-time attendance at a college or university in the state. The amount of the deduction would be equal to one-half of the tuition paid, up to a maximum \$1,000 deduction per student. Any Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) awards will be subtracted from the allowable deduction.

This unique deduction was part of the tax relief program approved by the State Legislature. It is a more simplified alternative than the Qualified Higher Education Funds (QHEF) program advanced by Governor Carey and also approved by the legislature.

Taxpayers will only be allowed to make use of one plan or the other. The \$1,000 tuition deduction will not be available to those who receive assistance from a qualified higher education fund.

The QHEF proposal will allow taxpayers to contribute to the higher education fund in the form of a trust or custodial account. These contributions would be deducted from federal adjusted gross income for the computation of state adjusted gross income. The amount of the deduction would be limited to \$750 for each eligible beneficiary.

The governor's program is not as generous in that the plan merely defers tax payments on QHEF funds. After the student graduates or leaves school, he or she will have five years to pay the tax due on the account funds.

It is argued that the governor's custodial account plan will encourage students to leave the state after graduation since — if they do not file a state tax return they will not have to pay the tax. This may or may not be the actual case but it cannot be denied that a flat tax deduction on tuition paid is more attractive than a deferred tax payment plan.

No matter what option taxpayers choose, two steps have been taken to assist in covering the ever-rising cost of higher education in New York State. Such tax incentive plans are necessary if we ever hope to maintain a degree of balance between public and private education insulations. Only by preserving the right to choose at affordable costs can we insure our children the right to quality education beyond high school.
