It is indeed an expensive proposition to send a son or daughter to college these days: \$1,500 yearly for community college; \$2,500 for SUNY: and \$6,000 or more for private colleges and universities. If the state has the resources available to hely taxpayers meet these expenses, we have a responsibility to see that they are offered.

For the first time New York State residents who have dependents in college may deduct a portion of the tuition 1000 from taxable state income.

Beginning with 1978 tax returns, a deduction will be allowed for tuition paid on behalf of each dependent in full-time attendance at a college or university in the state. The amount of the deduction would be equal to one-half of the tuition paid, up to a maximum \$1,000 deduction per student. Any Tuition Assistance Program TAR-awards will be subtracted from the allowable deduction.

This unique deduction was part of the tax relief program approved by the State Legisluture. It is a more simplified alternative than the Qualified Higher Education Funds (QHEF) program advanced by Governor Catev and also approved by the legislature.

Taxpayers will only be allowed to make use of one plan or the other. The \$1,000 tuition deduction will not be available to those who receive assistance from a qualified higher education fund.

The QHEF proposal will allow taxpayers to contribute to the bisher education fund in the form of a trust or catodial account. These contributions would be deducted from federal adjusted gross income for the computation of state adjusted gross income for the computation of state adjusted gross income. The amount of the deducation would be limited to \$750 for each eligible beneficiary!

The governor's orogram is not as generous in that the plan mereify defers tax payments on QHEF funds. No matter wha option taypayers choose, two siers have been taken to assist in covering the ever-rising cost of inguer education in New York State. Such tax meentive plans are necessary if we ever hope to maintain a degree of ballance between public and private education insulutions. Only by preserving the right to choose at affordable cost, can we insure our children the right to quality education beyond high school.
