FLOOD CONTROL BILL DENIED ASSEMBLY FLOOR DEBATE

Unfortunately, I must report that a bill which could help many citizens in areas suffering from local flood problems won't come up for debate on the floor of the Assembly this year.

Annually, localized flooding in many areas of upstate New York results in thousands of dollars of damage to municipal and private property. These costs are paid by individuals, insurance companies and the federal government. This is a needless waste when we realize that many of these local floods could easily be controlled and/or eliminated.

Assembly Minority Leader Perry Duryea and I proposed a comprehensive legislative plan that would provide funding for these smaller local flood control programs which federal agencies won't accept.

We have had nothing but good reports on how helpful this legislation would be to residents of small communities — villages, towns and counties. Strong support came from the New York State Farm Bureau and the federal Soil Conservation Service, expressing the opinion that the bill would plug a vital gap in the flood control process.

However, we find that a committee in the State Assembly, which hasn't even held one hearing on the bill, took it upon themselves to kill this very beneficial measure. I fear the reasons for the bill's demise were political.

The committee is controlled by Democrats under New York City leadership who repeatedly want all kinds of aid for their metropolis but want little money spent to protect property and lives in upstate areas.

The vote in the committee was along strict party lines, with Democrats opposed and Republicans supporting the bill. I am told by members of the committee that most of the opposition was expressed in a "tongue in cheek" manner.

The flood control bill was recognized as a good bill, but the Democrat leadership was not about to give Republicans any advantage in showing the people of New York State who is concerned about their problems.

Ironically, the Democrats' efforts to kill this worthwhile measure has only reinforced the fact that they won't support any major legislation that doesn't have a New York City label on it.

This initial setback means we will have to wait another year and reintroduce the bill. Hopefully the make-up of the Assembly will change enough in 1979 to ensure support for the local flood control program and to give the people some protection from another recurring problem.
