Her funeral was Wednesday, May 17 at Mulholland Funeral Home in Andover.

Greenwood Town Board voted Monday night to retain another lawyer in the Rogers Road dispute after Town Attorney Reginald Sootheran reported a conflict of interest would exist if he represented the Town on the issue. Philip Patti, lawyer for persons adjoining Rogers Road, was at the May Meeting to find out if the Town had taken any action. He said they wouldn't require the Town to open the road the full length. PROPOSAL WOULD GIVE SMALL BUSINESS BIG BOOST

I'm sure that most people would challenge me if I said that your local appliance dealer or your corner drugstore was the dominant force in New York State's economy today. But some real eye opening facts verify that statement.

Eighty-one per cent of all New York State workers are employed by firms with 10 or fewer employees. Ninety-one per cent of all workers are employed by companies with less than 100 employees. Truly, small business is a strong and positive influence on our state economy.

In fact, research shows that during our nation's recession — while major companies laid off hundreds and even thousands of employees at a time — small business, despite declining revenues, maintained stable employment rates.

Yet, it is astounding to examine New York State's position towards small business in the very large and significant arena of government purchases and contracts.

Would you believe that at this very moment, Japanese television sets purchased from a New Jersey retailer are being installed as monitors for a new attendance device in the New York State Assembly?

We should be buying television sets made by a New York business such as the Sylvania company in Batavia. Also, we should be making the actual purchase from a New York State retailer.

New York State contracts should go to those who are hiring New York State workers and paying New York State's taxes.

As a first step in improving the business climate for our smaller firms, I have joined Assembly Minority Leader Perry B. Durfee in sponsoring a simple, but far reaching series of bills to encourage small business growth and employment in New York State.

As the above example demonstrates, federal and state activities as they relate to small business have been too distant and often unproductive. State and local governments should take the lead by opening the door for small businesses to the billions of dollars of purchases made by the state and its localities each year.

Under current procedures, small businesses often can not afford to do business with the state. They can not afford to hire a full-time employee to search out and obtain government contracts. Nor do they have the resources to wade thru the bureaucratic maze of regulations and procedures.

To help reduce this impediment to small businesses which might pursue state government contracts, we have filed legislation to require the Department of Commerce to compile a directory of goods and services and the small business firms which could provide them. When a contract comes up for bid the appropriate small business would be notified by mail.

Another major deterrent to small business bidding on state contracts is the time lag between award of the contract and services and payment to the vendor. As a result, small businesses which tend to have limited capital often can not afford to do business with the state.

The legislation we have introduced would streamline the payment process, without sacrificing the stringent controls that now exist, and other financial roadblocks would also be removed.

This package of bills is an example of what can be done by a government sensitive to the needs of the people it is supposed to serve.

It only makes sense that the removal of obstacles from the path of business growth will achieve employment increases, incentive rewards for entrepreneurs and install a factor of economic prosperity in our state economy.
