TOWN OF GREENWOOD Letter To Taxpayers

As a taxpayer you have reason to be deeply interested in improving equity in the real property tax. Your Town Board has authorized participation in a Revaluation Program which will be directed by your assessors with assistance from the Steuben County Real Property Tax Service Agency: the New York State Board of Equalization and Assessment; and a professional consultant.

Assessment.

The project will be financed jointly by Steuben County Funds Federal Manpower Funds, and Town Funds.

Revaluation of all parcels in the

Town will be accomplished for the sole purpose of providing fair assessments. It is expected that final results will be used on the 1979 assessment roll. The program provides for future annual updating of values.

The work of collecting data for revaluation will start about May

13, 1978. Soon thereafter data enumators will call at your property to obtain necessary information. They will present identification and it is requested that you check this, and permit entry to your premises. If you have tenants occupying your property it will be appreciated if you have tenants occupying your property it will expreciated if you have tenants occupying your property it will be appreciated if you will ask them to permit inspection. Data onlected will refer to construction details only. Data on the interior of buildings is needed for fair valuation. Your coorration will be helpful to all taxpayers.

Actual values will be computed at a later time by modern appraisal methods. You will then be advised as to the valuation tentatively placed on your property and its effect on your taxes. You will have a chance to discuss this at an informal hearing with your assessors prior to filing of the tentative assessment roll. After that you will have available the usual grievance procedures before completion of the Final Assessment Roll.

We hope that you will join with this effort, in a cooperative spirit to help attain much needed equity in assessment.
