WASTE MANAGEMENT PLAN PROPOSED

A proposed state-wide source recovery program that will enable municipalities and counties to implement plans within three years will substantially reduce the amount of waste material dumped in the state.

The program, which was developed by the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) and approved by the Legislature in 1976, will require municipalities and counties to provide for the collection, transportation and disposal of waste materials. It will also provide for the development and operation of source recovery and solid waste management facilities.

Under the program, the state will be divided into 14 management regions which coincide with planning that has been underway by DEC since last fall. Of the counties comprising the 130th Assembly District, Allegany County would be included in the Southern Tier West region while Livingston and Ontario counties would be part of the Genesee-Finger Lakes region.

During the first year of the program the state will develop plans for each region based on economic feasibility, marketing capabilities and environmental needs. Local and county governments will have the option of participating in the regional program or implementing their own programs during the following two years.

The proposed program will give local communities greater control of landfills and dumps that must be phased out or reduced in number under the 1976 federal law. Communities will utilize the plans to determine the type of program that fits the needs and resources of each region.

Millions of tons of recoverable materials that could be used are needlessly buried each year, despite the fact that methods are available to separate out usable materials. The proposed program is designed to ensure that the vast amounts of material and the energy source they represent are reused during these periods of growing energy shortages and rising costs of primary materials.

The program is also designed to reduce the growing crisis of declining landfill areas and the need to find adequate disposal sites for sludge and other materials soon to be banned from current dumping grounds and waters.

Proper management of waste disposal has been a difficult problem of our modern society. Now that we have the tools and financial capabilities to effectively deal with the waste disposal problem, we should move on a sound plan for the benefit of all New York State residents.
