"Inside The State Capital"

(DURYFA-EMERY TAX CUT PLAN HAS BEEN READY)

The overwhelming approval by California voters of a measure to drastically reduce property taxes in that state has sent a loud and clear signal throughout the nation. It has signaled the rising national revolt against increasing taxation.

The California voters approved "Proposition 13" which essentially reduces property taxes by 60 percent and puts a cap on future property tax increases of two percent annually. The vote was nearly two to one in favor of the measure.

Considering all the warnings of gloom and doom issued by various California authorities about what the massive tax cut would mean, people obviously have indicated they are willing to live with drastically reduced services. Those who work and those who are retired and living on fixed incomes can no longer be expected to stand idly by as their incomes are first reduced by the effects of inflation and then by a barrage of taxes.

In New York State, we do not have the mechanism providing citizens to gather petition signatures to place a proposition on the ballot. However, we do have a quicker way to accomplish the same tax reducing goals. That is through immediate passage of a comprehensive tax reduction package.

Months ago, on January 4, 1978 to be precise, Assembly Republican Leader Perry Duryea introduced just such a plan. I am proud to be a co-sponsor.

Most importantly, the Duryea plan is not a one-shot election year maneuver. Rather, it is a long-range permanent tax reduction program to greatly relieve the tremendous tax burden on New York State residents.

Our plan calls for an overall reduction of \$2.2 billion including \$600 million in property tax relief. This would be accomplished over a four to five year period by committing the normal increase of tax collections (which comes thru regular economic growth) to tax reductions.

The Carey Administration calls this \$2.2 billion tax reduction plan laughable. They say it is ridiculous to commit future revenue growths for sustained tax reduction. The Carey Administration is wrong.

I believe the people of New York State want this kind of permanent tax reduction. They want an end to the continual take, take, take, of government at all levels.

It is not too late in the legislative year to address a long-term plan for spending control and major tax reductions in New York State. All that is needed is for Governor Carey to recognize the dire situation of state taxpayers and then to put his signature on paper, showing that he is willing to go along with a workable, orderly, permanent tax reduction program, like the Duryea \$2.2 billion comprehensive tax cut plan.
