

## Andover School Board Goes to Austerity Budget

A Special - Budget Meeting of the Board of Education of Andover Central School was called to order June 27, 1978, with the President, Conner Stephens, presiding. The following Board Members were present: Conner Stephens, Mary K. Slade, Richard Godown, Virginia Milligan arriving at 8:45 p.m.

Others present: Ethel Kelley, Elmo Barden, Curville R. Jordan, Franklin Russell and E. Van Stine.

The meeting was called to order by Conner Stephens at 7:50 P. M. The meeting was reconvened at the home of Mary K. Slade at 8:30 P. M.

Motion was made to hire Elmo Barden as Building Principal for a three year probationary appointment by Mary K. Slade, seconded by Richard Godown. Passed by 4 yes votes. Effective date of July 1, 1978 at the Salary of \$20,000 for twelve months.

Motion made by Conner Stephens to accept the resignation of Franklin Russell as Administrative Assistant. Seconded by Mary K. Slade. Passed by 4 yes votes. His resignation is effective on July 21st. Mr. Russell has accepted a position as Elementary Principal at Pine Valley Central School in South Dayton.

Motion made by Conner Stephens to accept the resignation of Elmo Barden as Industrial Arts Teacher. Seconded by Richard Godown. Passed by 4 yes votes.

Motion made by Richard Godown to go to a Contingent Budget, seconded by Mary K. Slade. Passed by 4 yes votes. The Contingent Budget will be a reduced budget reflecting a tax reduction of \$20,000 or \$4.00 per thousand of assessed valuation.

Motion was made to go to the people with the following propositions - Transportation, Sports Cafeteria Subsidy, Equipment, Library books, and use of the building for community events.

### Proposition Number One

Shall the sum of \$1,000 be appropriated to meet the expenditures for Equipment and the necessary tax therefor levied upon the taxable property of the school district?

### Proposition Number Two

Shall the sum of \$15,500 be appropriated to meet the expenditures for Interscholastic Athletics and the necessary tax therefor levied upon the taxable property of the school district?

### Proposition Number Three

Resolved, that an appropriation of \$43,372.00 be made for the school year 1978-79 to provide for the transportation of elementary and secondary students who live in areas for which transportation was provided in the school year 1977-78. (Personnel \$29,500.00, Equipment \$360.00, Contractual Expenses \$100.00, Supplies and expenses \$13,472.00).

### Proposition Number Four

Resolved, that an appropriation of \$2,200 be made for the school year 1978-79 to provide for the purchase of library books and the repair and replacement of library books.

### Proposition Number Five

Resolved, that the Board of Education is authorized to operate the cafeteria during the school year 1978-79 with a general fund subsidy not to exceed \$2,000.00.

### Proposition Number Six

Shall the Board of Education be authorized to continue to provide the use of school buildings and facilities to community organizations in accordance with State Law and Board policy at no cost to the public (Budgeted amount \$5,000).

This vote will be on July 18th between the hours of 2:00 and 8:00 P. M.

Meeting was adjourned at 10:00 P. M.
