RECKLESS AND ABSURD

"Reckless" and "Absurd" that's how the independent taxpayers group, Citizens Public Expenditure Survey, characterized Governor Carey's plan to increase state spending by passage of a \$539 million supplement to the \$12.3 billion 1978-79 state budget.

The \$12.3 billion spending level was already a state record high. It included \$1 billion in new state spending over last year, and surpassed the budget of just four years ago by \$2.5 billion.

The Carey proposal for a \$539 million supplemental budget would authorize another \$200 to \$250 million in new expenditures with the balance of the half-billion dollar proposal being reappropriations of monies already included in the initial budget.

CPES said, they believe the 1978-79 \$12.3 billion budget "is already woefully unbalanced with approximately \$1 billion in increased spending, coupled with a \$755 million reduction in state taxes." This adds up to a change in state revenues of \$1.8 billion over the previous year.

"Now the state plans to tack on another couple hundred million dollars to that figure in new spending," CPES noted. "How fiscally irresponsible can it get?"

"Has the tax revolt uprising in California fallen on deaf ears in New York?" CPES asked.

That question can best be answered by stating that the majority of state legislators are listening intently, but that apparently Governor Carey and some of his New York City Democrat colleagues want to continue their past course of self-interest.

Everyone in the state should take note of the fact that it is Governor Carey who designed and proposed the \$539 million supplemental budget plan on his own.

We all should remember also that to a man the Republicans of the State Legislature have rejected this outrageous spending plan.

Since the governor offered his \$539 million spending plan; the majority leadership of the Democrat-controlled State Assembly has presented its own \$250 million proposal; the outnumbered Assembly Republicans have repeatedly stated they would oppose any plan to increase state spending; and the Republican-controlled State Senate has passed a \$22 million bare-bones supplemental budget that includes reappropriations with no new spending.

So if actions speak louder than words, then clearly CPES has learned that apparently the Democrat Governor and some of his Democrat Assembly colleagues have turned a deaf ear to the pleas of taxpayers while the Republican lawmakers are working for state government spending controls.
