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Citizens Committee Advice Ignored In ACS Budget Vote

The Ad Hoc "Citizens For Better Education Committee" which appeared to be composed of Self-Appointed malcontents with Edward Van Stine Chairman, issued public statements in area Daily Newspapers urging School voters to boycott voting on the six Propositions at Tuesday's ACS Budget Proposals. However, their efforts appeared to have failed as 205 voters showed up at the polls which was only 23 fewer than in June. (July being a very popular vacation month, more than likely many residents were out of town and not available to vote.)

Proposition Number Five — Resolved, that the Board of Education is authorized to operate ine cafeteria during the school year 1978-79 with a general subsidy not to exceed \$2,00. Yes — 99. No. 102.

Proposition Number Six — Shall the Board of Education be authorized to continue to provide the use of school buildings and facilities to community organizations in accordance with State Law and Board policy at no cost to the public (Budgeted amount \$5,000.)

It is felt in certain quarters that perhaps the rejection of the Citizen's group appeal to boycott the voting could be attributed as a disavowal of the last paragraph of the article that appeared of the front page of the Thursday, July 13. 1978 Edition of the Evening Tribune which read: "Van Schne called the statement issued by Curville Jordan, superintendent of Andover Central School, Liest."

This appears to be a very strong statement and if what Mr. Jordan stated could be proven to be the truth, a statement like this could be interpreted as libel and perhaps the basis of a lawsuit. In fact, we have been told by a reliable source that this matter has been turned over to a prominent area Attorney for study and possible action. To say that someone may be mistaken is one thing — but, to call someone a liar — is an altogether different matter, and a very serious charge.
