The Election of Town Officers in Andover, Tuesday, was a hot contest affair. Never before was there so much cutting the ticket. There were 749 votes cast and it is safe to say 699 of them cut the ticket, somewhere. The result was in the election of 8 Democrats and 7 Republicans to Office. There were however, but 8 local contests. The Democrats winning 5 of the 8. Fred S. Potter, R, was elected Supervisor over J. L. Williams D, by 38 votes. J. D. Cheesman, D, was elected Town Clerk over Archie Bloss by 108 votes. A. L. Rogers, D, won for Justice of Peace over E. F. Stearns by 70 votes. Wm. Wahl, R, won for Justice of Peace over Leo DeRemer by 111. Al Wood, D, received 209 more votes than his opponent W. S. Calhoun for Assessor for 4 years. Charles E. Burdick, R, won over Henry Joyce D, by 132 for Assessor for 2 years. Mrs. Nora F. Horan, D, was elected as Collector over Robert Brundage, R, by 95 votes and Al Brown won for Overseer of the Poor over C. E. Hann by 115 votes. There was no contest for Superintendent of Highways as Earl Howland was unopposed. No contest for School Directors or Contables. B. S. Brundage, D, and Mrs. Edith Cheesman, D, were elected School Directors and the Constables were: Edward Kilbane, Harry Kemp, Jett Blodgett, John C. Lever and L. E. Davis.

### "Inside The State Capital"

#### TAX FREEZE PROPOSAL OFFERED

Assembly Minority Leader Perry B. Duryea and I have introduced a package of three bills designed to put the brakes on state and local tax increases, to begin a process of reexamination of so-called state mandates that have served to force constantly increasing local tax levies and to amend the State Constitution to require a two-thirds majority for approval of the creation of new taxes or increases in rates of existing taxes.

These tax limiting measures when tied to the already existing Duryea-Emery proposal for a 20 per cent, \$2.2 billion, multi-year cut in state taxes recommended just October, constitute a hard-hitting, responsible approach to the tax spiral.

Governor Carey's approach — three years of tax increases and one election year tax cut — will simply not fill the bill.

Our phased-in state tax reduction would be financed from tight

state expenditure controls, and a significant allocation of each year's state tax revenue growth would go to tax reduction.

In addition, the phase-in tax cuts constitute a long-term commitment to a sound New York State economy and the most effective advertisement; that New York State can become a great place to have a job and to bring a job.

The proposals introduced this past week assume that a tax limiting constitutional amendment will ultimately be approved by the people. However, under our constitutional system that process will take three years. In the meantime, Mr. Duryea and I are concerned that while we are searching for and approving a tax limiting amendment to the Constitution, an orgy of tax rate increases not be permitted.

We propose a freeze on all state and local tax rates. This includes a prohibition on extensions of existing taxes to previously untaxed income, goods and services. It was under an illegal interpretation of these powers that the Carey administration extended the sales tax to home cable TV monthly bills.

Our tax freeze measures are so drafted as to protect municipalities for changes in state equalization rates; take into consideration New York City's financing program and guarantee that community debt service requirement will not be impaired.

Last, but certainly not least, we propose the constitutional tax limitation recognize that in our governmental system there is provision for an extraordinary majority in the approval of especially important governmental matters. Two-thirds of the U. S. Senate must approve an amendment to the U. S. Constitution. Therefore, on the state and local level, we feel that the creation or increase of any tax is so important an issue that two-thirds of any elected governmental body should be required to approve such matters. Our legislation would require this.

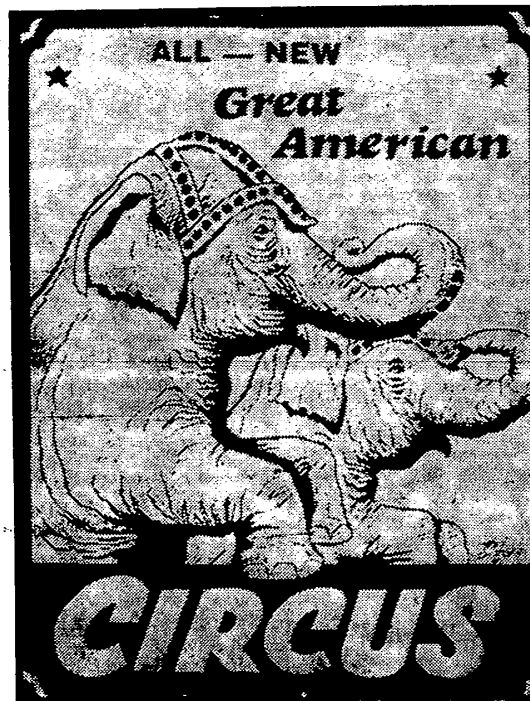
Steps must be taken to hold down the cost of government and action should be taken now.
