

Fourth of July Celebration Is A BIG Success

The Annual Fourth of July Celebration turned out to be another big success as an estimated crowd of between 6 to 10,000 persons watched the parade and participated in the day's festivities.

Despite the threat of rain, 78 units participated in the Parade which was a little smaller than the previous year, but the crowd in attendance seemed to enjoy the floats, bands and marching units as well as the entertainment provided by the Ismailia Kart Corps based in Olean, N. Y., of which two local residents, George McAndrew and Mayor Ralph "Red" Allen are members.

The Parade which got underway shortly after 10:00 a. m., was preceded by the crowning of Clara Norris as "Senior Citizen's Queen" and the presentation of a bouquet of roses to her by last year's Queen Florida Tomm. Among the presentations made at the reviewing stand prior to the Parade, was a Plaque presented to Mayor Ralph A. Allen by Melba Mickle, Secretary of the Association, which included the other 14 Grand Marshals of previous 4th of July Parades and Mr. James Kessler, who had been selected as this year's Grand Marshal. It was requested that this plaque be placed in the Village Office with each year's Grand Marshal added annually.

Chamber of Commerce Orders Trees

The Andover Chamber of Commerce will take orders for shade trees for Fall planting within the Village, until September 1, 1978. Available to plant at this time will be a choice of Emerald Queen Norway Maple, Crimson King Maple, Green Ash and Honey Locust.

The Emerald Queen Norway Maple grows to sixty feet and has dark green heavy foliage. It has an upright oval crown, grows rapidly and well in silty to clay loam.

The Crimson King Maple grows to thirty-five feet has a deep red color retained throughout the summer and dense foliage. It grows well in silty to clay loam.

The Green Ash grows to sixty feet, has rapid straight growth with dark green foliage, grows well in medium loam and tolerates wet soil.

Shademaster Locust grows to forty feet, is an upright vase shaped tree with dark green foliage. It grows well in rich, silty clay loam.

The C of C is making these trees available at a cost of \$15.00 per tree which includes tree ties, wrapping and all material and labor necessary. The Jaycees will assist the Village workers and the C of C with the planting project.

To place your order call the Andover Village Office 478-8455 by September 1, 1978. Planting will begin about October 15.

People who wish to plant trees outside the Village limits may purchase trees at this price with the responsibility for planting their own.

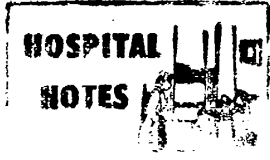
