**"Inside The State Capital"**

New York State has some new laws in its arsenal to combat the rising tide of violent criminal acts perpetrated throughout the state. Adult offenders face stiffer penalties for serious crimes, plea bargaining restrictions are imposed, and increased penalties for violent and repeat juvenile offenders are the major points of the new anti-crime package.

With the passage of these measures I believe we are one step closer to the goal of strengthening law enforcement so that safety can be restored to our communities. I am pleased with the success we achieved in passing a strong crime fighting package.

As reported by an Albany newspaper, the major principles of the new anti-crime package "have been taken from Republican measures pushed earlier this year" — measures, I am pleased to say, I co-sponsored.

Much of the earlier legislation had passed the Republican controlled State Senate, but Republican sponsorship of the bills caused them to be blocked in the Democrat-controlled State Assembly. It is an election year and neither Governor Carey nor the Democrat legislators wanted to give Republicans any credit for their efforts.

But a threat to the governor's political life changed things and I am happy to note that with the exception of the death penalty, most of the strong points of the Republican crime program have been approved.

The major provisions adopted include:

- mandatory sentences and restricted plea bargaining for armed felons;
- closing loopholes in the current sentencing structure which allows multiple offenders to serve sentences concurrently rather than consecutively;
- makes juveniles age 13 and above criminally responsible for their conduct, with their cases tried in criminal courts rather than Family court;
- restricting youths above age 15 with previous criminal records or who commit a felony from eligibility for youthful offender status; and
- added resources to local courts and criminal justice agencies for effective processing of criminal actions and proceedings.

The severity of the crime crisis required drastic action long before this. But finally, outraged public opinion has been successful in bringing even one of the state's most liberal governors into the war against crime. Law enforcement agencies and the courts can begin the urgently needed crack-down on crime.
